

















The mountain across it 天峰岭 also reduces its exposure to the sun....with only 3 hours (?) of direct sunlight in the summer









The structure was refurbished thru-out the different dynasties

Today's style is that of the Ming and the Ching Dynasties








These beams,

supporting structure










It's believed that the joint blessings of the three religions have enabled the temple to remain standing after 1,510+ years

Some steep too




The floor is slippery from wear













